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
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Company, Melville College Trust and the new Chairman of the Governing Council, Alasdair Seale have been other highlights.

SPORTS CLUBS UPDATE

Rugby Club

For the first time in several years, the 1st XV are playing in National League 1 this season - the highest tier of amateur rugby in Scotland.

In their first game, the 1st XV welcomed GHK RFC to Inverleith. GHK cruised through National 2 last season whereas we rather staggered over the finishing line to earn promotion. Despite that, the 1st XV defeated the men from Glasgow 27-21 with the new President

of the SRU, our very own Colin Rigby, watching proudly from the stand.

The 1st XV have, sadly, lost all 8 of their games since then. A number of these were against teams likely to be fighting for promotion at the end of the season (Ayr, Kelso, Gala) but the rest were against teams that (like us) are likely to be fighting to avoid relegation at the end of the season.

The 1st XV have managed to pick up 3 losing bonus points in defeat but still sit bottom of the table. With three teams

due to be relegated this season due to league reconstruction, it's not a good time to be the new boys in the Division!

The 2nd XV have, like the 1st XV, suffered from injuries and player availability and currently sit third bottom in their league. They shouldn't have to worry about relegation as they will lose less players to the 1st XV as players continue to return from injury.

The social scene remains strong at the club with Vice President Jason Conlin organising a very well received

Family Fun Day for the GHK game. Jason is also organising Community Days this season, bringing together our sponsors, ESMS 6th Year pupils and Special Needs children from the Edinburgh area. The first Community Day will take place at Royal High and Mary Erskine's on Sunday 20th November. A Burns Supper is also planned.

Everyone at the club was delighted to hear that former player Callum Hunter-Hill (SMC 2014) has been called into the Scotland squad for the Autumn International against Argentina.

Cricket Club

The Club had a busy summer of cricket in 2022. The 1st XI won more Eastern Premier League matches than ever before. The 2nd XI were crowned ESCA Division 2 champions, finishing strongly to pip Edinburgh Accies on the final day. The 3rd XI finished in 5th place again despite winning more games than last summer and provided playing opportunities to a great number of talented youngsters. The 4th XI had an excellent campaign and gained promotion out of League 7 which was a fantastic transition from a bottom placed finish in 2021.

The Women's team reached the Scottish Cup Final after a superb performance upset favourites Carlton in the Semi Final. The section continues to grow from strength to strength, competing in the Scottish Women's Premier League and the inaugural Women's Challenger League.

The junior section also had a great year. The breadth of the programme continues to expand driven by the tireless efforts of David Gibson. From the 'All Stars' cricket through to the Under 18 Colts, nearly 300 children participated in the Club's junior cricket offering across the summer with the Under 12 and Under 14 sections often fielding three separate teams on the same evening! The quality of the young players progressing through the junior structure and participating regularly in the Saturday teams continues to improve as the results testify.

Hockey Club

It has been a busy year for the Club and hockey has been enthusiastically embraced by all, helped in no small part by the new water-based pitch which has meant that the L1s could compete in Premiership hockey at home for the first time (previously they had to play at Peffermill).

Congratulations to the Men's 1 team who have continued to make Club history by building on their promotion out of National 3 pre-Covid to secure promotion to the Premiership for next season. Coach Andrew Brogdon credits the hard work and dedication into creating pathways from the youth section into adult hockey, especially on the men's side. There are many who have contributed to this but the Club is particularly grateful to Ally Dodge who stepped down from his Youth Hockey involvement this season.

The youth section continues to go from strength to strength in terms of playing numbers and participation across all age groups. There has also been particularly strong representation in both district and national youth squads from the Club. The youth section also continue to run incredibly successful hockey camps over the summer and Easter and the vision of widening hockey participation through partnership with local primary schools through stick donations and sharing both facilities and knowledge continues to develop and will hopefully soon become even more accessible.

At the other end of the age scale, many players across the men's and women's sections have been selected to represent Scotland at masters level. The Club has many people to thank for last season from all the coaches and Captains to the club members who sit on the committees, umpires, supporters and parents. The Club is looking forward to the upcoming season and seeing the teams flourish in their 35th year of hockey.


The 2022-23 Season is underway with again three rinks playing league curling.

Current Internationalists

While our Rugby Club have so far struggled to impose themselves in National League One following promotion at the end of last season it is a cause for satisfaction within the Stew Mel community that four former pupils have been called into Gregor Townsend's Scotland squad for this season's Autumn Internationals at some point.

Callum Hunter-Hill (SMC 2014) was a recent call up as a second row forward to the Scotland squad for the last of the Autumn internationals and it comes as no surprise to those who have followed his progress from a Scottish Schools Cup winning 1st XV. Thereafter he started his senior rugby career at Inverleith with Stewart's Melville before being directed to Stirling County. Following this in his professional career he had periods with Glasgow Warriors, London Scottish and Edinburgh Rugby and one appearance for Newcastle before he joined Saracens for season 2019-20. There he has played now in excess of fifty games in the English Premiership and is on a long-term contract.

George Turner (SMC 2010) plays for Glasgow Warriors and has been a regular choice in Scotland squads since November 2017. He played in his 29th international at hooker v Fiji and scored an eighth international try before retiring from the field with an injury. A notable achievement was his scoring of three tries v Canada in a 2018 Summer international. His introduction

to senior rugby was at Inverleith with Stewart's Melville

Jamie Hodgson (SMC 2016) who plays for Edinburgh Rugby has five international appearances to date having made his debut v Tonga in October 2021. He was called into the squad as cover for the second-row positions in the first of this season's Autumn internationals. His introduction to senior rugby was at Inverleith with Stewart's Melville.

Ross Thompson (SMC 2017) plays for Glasgow Warriors and also made an international debut for Scotland in the October 2021 match v Tonga being successful with two conversion kicks. To date he has three international appearances and came into this season's squad after Adam Hastings suffered injury. He captained the school 1st XV in his last year at school and in his senior career has played for Glasgow Hawks and Ayrshire Bulls before signing up with the Warriors.

Former Pupils in Business - Alan Morrison



In a new feature aiming to focus on younger alumni working in business, Ken Russell spoke to Alan S Morrison, DSMC 1982, **Public Relations Practitioner** at ASM Media & PR about his career journey so far.

What were your favourite subjects when you were at school?

English, History and Economics.

When you left school, did you have a career path in mind?

Yes – I was a news junkie, so interested in pursuing a career in journalism and the careers assessment at school showed I had sufficient ability and interest to make that a feasible option. So I aimed to get an Arts degree at Glasgow University in order to get the first degree required to apply for entry to the postgraduate journalism



diploma course at Cardiff University. I succeeded in both - graduating with an MA Honours in English and Philosophy in 1986 and postgraduate Diploma in Journalism Studies in 1987.

Did you find it tough getting your first role after graduating or was the pathway quite straightforward?

It took me a year to get my first permanent job in journalism because I'd specialised in broadcast journalism, principally radio, at Cardiff and starter jobs in that in Scotland were scarce. So I worked in an off-licence and then a bookshop in Glasgow (where my girlfriend lived) before finally getting my start as a Reporter at The Sunday Post, based in its Edinburgh office. In retrospect, I shouldn't have restricted my job search to Scotland, but young love is a powerful career distraction!

What helped to guide you to your role today?

The free composition essays Mr Robertson set my class in 3rd Year English were pivotal in helping me discover my talent for writing. I enjoyed writing and his praise for my work gave me the confidence to think seriously about a career as a writer. The careers assessment showed it was realistic.

Journalism is the classic route in Public Relations and, as I said, I was a news junkie from my teens - reading newspapers every day, watching Newsnight and listening to BBC Radio Scotland – so the idea of working in news appealed greatly.

I was bitten by the broadcast bug when my mum, an advocate, was a guest on BBC Radio Scotland's teenagers show The Sunday Club and I came along to see what it was like.

Six bright, precocious teens would interview guests live in the studio and some would record interviews

and features through the week. I got chatting with the Producer and ended up appearing in 18 programmes including recording features and interviewing Spandau Ballet, Clare Grogan and John Peel. I also managed to get yearmates Neil Lucas, Nicholas Holroyd and Douglas Armstrong on the show.

After 23 years in newspapers reporting, running and launching papers in England and finally as a Sub-Editor back at The Sunday Post - my role disappeared in a restructure in 2011. I could see print journalism was unlikely to be a career till retirement, so transitioned into Public Relations – first in an agency in Manchester and then running my own company based in Forfar, which also offers PR and event photography and copywriting.

What do you do day-to-day?

I'm mostly doing Public Relations for SME and charity clients based in Angus, Dundee and Fife. No two days are the same, but regular activities include keeping abreast of the news to spot newsjack opportunities, monthly calls with clients to discuss projects for news and feature articles as well as other communications, doing research, planning, writing copy, taking photos, liaising with media, compiling media coverage and evaluation reports, writing blogs, networking, sifting email newsletters for media job moves relevant to clients and social media changes worth sharing on my social. I also try to do some CPD every week - to keep my skills up to date and maximise client outcomes.

What do you like most about your job?

I love being paid to help people – something I naturally enjoy. Public Relations is about helping organisations achieve their goals through building and maintaining good relationships with stakeholders and it's really satisfying to see the positive effect on people's lives of having helped a client to help them.

What has been the most challenging part of your career so far?

Changing career from journalism to Public Relations in 2011. Although there's a big overlap in the skills, the mindset and ways of working are very different. Most of all, changing how I saw myself was very hard as being a journalist was a core part of my identity.

Which professional achievements are you most proud of?

In journalism, I wrote a story for The Sunday Post about an Edinburgh charity helping three orphanages in post-revolution Romania improve living conditions. It made the front page and led to three HGVs full of beds and other kit plus 57 volunteer nurses, plumbers and electricians going to help them. Never underestimate the power of information to make positive change!

More recently, I led the turnaround project at St Andrews Business Club which saw it more than double membership and event attendance over two years to a new club record thanks to a great team effort. Being club President at the end of its most successful year was a very proud moment.

What's your fondest memory from your schooldays?

Carbisdale was a turning point in my life - where I first discovered I could achieve things I wouldn't have believed were possible for me if only I fully committed to them. After that it felt worthwhile setting goals, because for the first time I believed I could achieve them. Even at the time I realised it was where my mindset moved from child to young man.

What are your hobbies?

Photography for me started as a hobby and became a passion I got paid for doing professionally. It's still something I enjoy doing for my own pleasure and creative expression.

Have any school values or habits stayed with you?

Doing things properly and being 'Never Unprepared' are core values I thank DSMC for instilling in me.



SMC ARCHIVES

I took over tenure as Archivist in March this year. Upon the retirement of my predecessors David McLeish and Dorothy Sharp, the schools merged their Archivists roles into one ESMS position. I split time as equally as I can between the archive in the attics of Old College and that in Ravelston House.

Some of the biggest steps forward in these past nine months have been in the complete digitisation of the Daniel Stewart's magazine and The Collegian until the year 2000. These are fully available on the public Archives website here: https://archives.esms.org.uk/ The Melville College Chronicle will follow as we continue to work with our external digitisation partner: SDS Schools Records Management.

A lot of foundation work has also been undertaken to support a full reorganisation of the archive. Latterly, this will include a digital catalogue which will revolutionise the way we use the archive; it will make the entire collection "searchable" to members of staff and will function

as a database for information on the material that we hold. This step into the 21st century will set the archive up for expanded use throughout the schools and our wider communities but also for future Archivists too.

The project will require moving and cataloguing every object that we hold, so we anticipate significant distribution for the entirety of the project. We are still happy to answer enquiries and support FP events to the best of our abilities during this time but please expect delays. We also kindly ask that there is a refrain from sending material for the archive to the school until this project is complete. All available storage space will be used and we do

> not want any neglected or lost material during that time.

A recent addition to the archive has been the campaign medal belonging to Daniel Stewart's 1913-4 Dux: Donald Morton Brown. In his final year of school, Donald won six subject prizes and was awarded two bursaries to support his attendance of the University of Edinburgh to read in the Arts, a program he would not finish before leaving for war. Donald was a valued and successful member of the Stewart's community and we are thankful for the opportunity to remember him specifically this year. You can read more about him in the Issue 1 of the 1914 edition of The Collegian which is available in our archives online.

> While preparing an Archives display at this

year's Remembrance event, we also came across Donald's original service photograph. On the 11th, we displayed the photo, alongside the medal and Donald's Dux and Roll of Honour entries. Adding more personal insight into the names on the war memorial is a great way to see the potential in the archives. Moving forward, we hope to commemorate some Mary Erskine FPs who served the country during wartime, alongside the fallen from Daniel Stewart's and Melville Colleges.

Valencia next for Dougie after brilliant win in Loch Ness Marathon

In December, former pupil Dougie Selman will travel to Spain for the upcoming Valencia Marathon in fine fettle, after he recently won the Loch Ness Marathon closer to home. Now 34 and working in Edinburgh as Legal Counsel, Selman has been a keen athlete since he was a student at Stewart's Melville College, competing at a high level over the years.

At the 20th Loch Ness Marathon, last month, Selman paced his race very well to finish the men's race first, ahead of well-known Kenyan athlete Isaiah Kosgei and Shaun Cumming (Highland Hill Runners). In the highlands, he ran a time of 2hr 23min 53secs and said: "It was really enjoyable. Breaking the tape at the finish line is not something you get to do often as an athlete, in a marathon, so I just tried to enjoy the moment.

"It was quite late in the race when I went ahead, but I was still feeling pretty good at that point. I was running in quite a controlled manner and going into those last couple of miles your legs have taken quite a pounding, but I knew I had enough in the tank to get the job done. The Loch Ness Marathon is always a big event with a lot of competitors there and a lot of families so that, combined with a great setting and a pleasing result, made it a very good day."

For Selman, his sights are now firmly set on the Valencia Marathon, and training for the next challenge has already started. Being married to Jenny Sleman, a member of the Team Scotland athletics squad at the Birmingham Commonwealth Games, means it's a family passion and there's plenty of support at home.

But where did it all begin? For Selman, his passion for running came later in his school years, having tried lots of different sports and activities at Junior

School. "When I entered my last few years at Stewart's Melville College, I started to take my athletics a bit more seriously. "At that point I was more of an 800 metre runner rather than a marathon runner, but athletics took up a lot of my time at school and I loved it - and still do!"

SMC Head of PE and Sport Bryn Lockie said: "I remember him well as a pupil and an excellent athlete. He always struck me as a dedicated performer, who even with his numerous athletics commitments outside school, was always happy to represent the school in fixtures, at sports days and in Scottish School events.

"He was an excellent role model for our younger pupils both in school and on the track. We are delighted to see another one of our former pupils doing so well in their chosen sport."

Robert Gillespie Swan, 1945-2021 (Melville College 1949-1963)



Robert was born in Edinburgh and attended Melville College from Primary one to sixth year. Robert's father, his three uncles from the Gillespie family and his brother William were all former pupils. Robert enjoyed sport at school and had a very good eye for a ball, playing both hockey and rugby. However, golf was his real forte. He won the gent's senior championship at Liberton Golf Club a total of seven times. He also played in the Scottish Boy's Championship, the British Youth's Championship and he also was triallist for the Scottish Boy's Tam. He was a Melville College team member in the Dispatch Trophy.

Robert left school and despite having the qualifications necessary to attend university, he decided to pursue a career in banking following in his grandfather's footsteps.

He joined Clydesdale Bank as a clerk and, by passing banking examinations, he progressed and attained membership of the Institute of Bankers. During this time, he took the post of Accountant at the Mid Calder branch. His continued progress saw him become Manager at Nicholson Square branch Edinburgh in 1977 and a final move as Manager to St Andrews in 1984.

He was greatly respected during his working life and will be greatly missed by all who knew him through his involvement in local activities: St Andrews Rotary Club, The Boys Brigade, The Ladies Putting Club, and the New Club and his membership of The Royal and Ancient Golf Club. Robert was married to Nina for fifty one years and she survives him along with their twin sons Andrew and Brian and grandchildren Veronica, Douglas and Lily.

Alistair Campbell Skene, 1934-2020 (Daniel Stewarts 1952)



Alistair Skene who died aged 86 was a highly regarded and popular figure who made his mark in various walks of life, in business, sport, as a piper, in a wide range of community activities and as a much loved family man. He may have been short of stature but his big heartedness, positivity and engaging nature earned him the affection and respect of all with whom he came into contact. An individual who was genuinely interested in people and always ready to help, he made a much appreciated contribution in all he did.

Alistair Campbell Skene was born in Kuala Lumpur, the only child of Alexander and Gladys. When back on leave in Aberdeen in 1939, war broke out with Alistair and his mother remaining here as his father returned to Malaya. In 1941 the ship on which his father was coming back was bombed near Ireland and although he was rescued, he later died of hypothermia.

In 1946, on moving to live in the Blackhall area of Edinburgh, Alistair began attending Daniel Stewart's

College. There he developed his lifelong love of rugby and piping, representing the school at both. After school, Alistair went to study printing at college in Leeds, paving the way for his future

In 1956 he was called up for National Service with the Royal Scots Fusiliers and found himself back in Malaya, this time on active service dealing with the communist insurgency.

On his return to Edinburgh he joined McLagan and Cumming Printers, and played rugby for Stewart's F.P.'s as a scrum half. In 1963 Alistair joined McCorquodale's in Wolverton, Bucks., where he met future wife Sheila.

In 1966 he and Sheila were married and would go on to enjoy 54 years of happy marriage during which they had three sons, Andrew, Hamish and Iain. He set up his own printing company, Skeneprint, in Aberdeen in 1973.

Although he lived in Aberdeen, Daniel Stewart's was very much part of his life, being heavily involved with the Aberdeen branch, serving as both secretary and President and organised the annual dinner for many years. He served as President of the parent club in Edinburgh from 1992-93.

He was also involved with Rotary Club, serving a term as President of the Aberdeen St. Nicholas branch and also Aberdeenshire Rugby Club, again serving a term as President.

After retiring from business aged 61, he had no difficulty keeping active, pursuing interests in beekeeping, hillwalking, fly fishing and as volunteer guide at the Gordon Highlanders' Museum.

In 2008 he and Sheila moved to Ballater with Alistair immersing himself in local activities including Probus and bowling as well as the Pipe Band. A full life well lived, Alistair is survived by his wife, sons, daughter in law Rini, and three grandchildren, Alexander, Kyla and Findlay.

Samuel James (Jim) Hall, 1930-2022 (Daniel Stewart's College 1948)

Jim Hall, OBE, WS passed away peacefully on 7 March 2022, at Erskine Hospital.

Jim was the much loved husband of Olive (his wife of over 64 years), father of Anne, Douglas and Alastair, a grandfather and great-grandfather.

He was born on 29 May 1930 and attended Daniel Stewart's College (as it then was), between 1936 – 1948. In fact, the College was in his family's blood. His father (Sam) attended before the First World War, his younger brother (Ian) attended – as did his 2 sons (Douglas and Alastair) and also one of his grandsons (Hamish). He was president of the Stewarts' Melville College FP Club for a number of years. He was a very proud FP!


After school, he attended Edinburgh University, graduating as a lawyer. Between 1952-1954 he undertook National Service, reaching the rank of Captain in the Royal Army Service Corps.

Immediately following his National Service (and whilst continuing as a commissioned Officer in the Territorial Army for about nine years), Jim commenced his career as a lawyer - eventually becoming the senior partner at Robson, McLean and Paterson WS. His greatest career achievement was his appointment as Solicitor to Her Majesty's Admiralty Board in Scotland. A post he held for many years and for which he was justly proud to be awarded the OBE by the Princess Royal in 1997.

Jim enjoyed a very active retirement. He and Olive played lots of golf at Bruntsfield (where he was the longestserving member) and also at Olive's club, Ravelston. They enjoyed annual golfing trips, including to the US where they made many new friends and spent time with relatives. They travelled extensively throughout Australia/New Zealand (where they have wonderful grandchildren/great-grandchildren), North America, Europe and Asia. He was also an elder at Palmerston Place Church. He enjoyed watching rugby often accompanied by his 2 sons at Stewarts' Melville games in the 1970s.

However, first and foremost, Jim was a family man. He was a wonderful husband to Olive (whom he adored) and a much loved father to his children (whom he loved and sought to support and mentor). His family and all of his many friends and associates will remember Jim fondly, as a determined gentle man - with a very warm and cheeky smile, to the end.

Duncan Fairlie (Class of 1978)



Duncan Fairlie died on 27 April 2022. He was married with two children and lived in Williamsburg Virginia.

Duncan went from school to St Andrews University where he gained a 1st class hons BSc in Mathematics (1982). Following University he worked at the UK Meteorological Office, and then in 1987 work for NASA in Virginia, USA, where he remained as an research scientist until his retiral in 2021. In 2009 he was also awarded a PhD in Earth and Planetary Science by Harvard University. Besides his mathematical achievements, fellow pupils might also remember him being useful on the golf course!

Allan Hare (Melville College 1956-1964)

It is with sadness that I write to advise of my brother Allan's death at the age of 74. He died at the City Hospital, Nottingham on 21 April 2022, after a fight with cancer.



Allan Hare (Melville College 1956 -1964) was born at the Welsh Mission Hospital in Shillong, Assam, India. With our parents working overseas Allan, like myself, was a boarder at Buckingham Terrace, under the watchful eyes of Jimmy and Jane Ray, acting "in loco parentis". Allan was, by his own admission not particularly academic but he was, nevertheless, a good all rounder at the sports on offer at the time. He had a ready sense of humour and was popular with his contemporaries at school.

On leaving school in 1964, Allan completed his education at the naval officer training school, HMS Conway, Angelsey, Wales. He was greatly disappointed that he was unable to pursue a career in the merchant navy due to a minor eyesight deficiency.

Not to be denied an "active" career, Allan joined the army in 1966 and spent 22 years serving with the Intelligence Corps; a corps within the British Army responsible for gathering, analysing and disseminating military intelligence and also for counterintelligence and security.

The Intelligence Corps played a major role in counterintelligence during the Cold War and a number of his postings were to the then West Germany and to Berlin. As well the Russia focussed work, the Corps was heavily involved in Northern Ireland and, in 1979, he was mentioned in despatches by the Ministry of Defence for his services in Northern Ireland during the "Troubles".

British interests in Bahrein, Cyprus and Belize (formerly British Honduras) involved security arrangements which saw Allan also posted to these locations. Much of his work was classified and, understandably, he wasn't at liberty to talk much about his activities. There is,



however, an interesting reference to him in the book "Sharing The Secret: The History of the Intelligence Corps 1940-2010" which gives an indication to the nature of his work.

Belize achieved independence in 1981 but British forces remained for "an appropriate period" in support of the Belize Defence Force. Guatemalan Special Forces (the Kaibiles) continued to hassle Belize. On 31 July 1982 Warrant Officer 2 Allan Hare was on tour in Belize as the Force Security Warrant Officer and was covering for the Field Intelligence NCO (West) when it was reported that some Guatemalans had infiltrated into Belize. Hare, and his small team, intercepted the vehicle, arrested the occupants (including a lieutenant colonel commanding the Kaibiles). The vehicle revealed documents that the Kaibiles were massing on the border. As a result Belize lodged a protest at the United Nations.

On leaving the army Allan joined the Royal Kent Constabulary. During this time he received the Kent Chief Constable's commendation for bravery for dragging an unconscious man out of a burning house before the fire brigade arrived.

While living in Australia, my regular visits to the UK have allowed me to see Allan most years. Unfortunately travel restrictions due to Covid prevented me from visiting these last two and a

half years. Allan's rapid deterioration in health denied me the opportunity to see him once again.

His first wife, Elizabeth, predeceased him. He is survived by his daughter, Catherine, son, Christopher, three grandchildren and his second wife, Tanya.

Adrian Weatherhead, 2022 (DSC 1958-1962)



Adrian Weatherhead was an outstanding athlete who in a long, distinguished career enjoyed much success in a variety of disciplines and a reputation as one of the country's most determined, single-minded competitors.

Best known as a middle distance track runner who ran four sub-four minute miles (plus some equivalent "metric miles" at 1500m), he earned seven Great Britain international vests and six Scottish ones. His top level repertoire extended from the half mile/800m to 5,000m and even included a season as a steeplechaser when he won the Scottish Championship. His range of abilities and longevity were vouched



through his appearance every year in several events in the Scottish ranking lists from 1965 to 1981.

Despite not training for cross country and seldom competing in it, he was runner-up three times in the prestigious Scottish National Championship, against huge fields of participants, and represented Scotland seven times, including at two World Championships. In the latter stages of his career he turned to road racing, competing with distinction seven times between 1983 and 1990 in the famous Edinburgh to Glasgow Relay, his final appearance made at the age of 46.

Adrian was the first to recognise that while a decent schoolboy athlete he was not exceptional, nor did he have huge natural talent. However, through determination and years of application, he succeeded in attaining international status and becoming a sub-four minute miler. When young he had been told by a sports master that his future as an athlete would be limited, a prognosis he delighted in confounding.

Although utterly committed to his running, Adrian was no blinkered automaton but a well-rounded, infectiously likeable gent with an outgoing, engaging and spontaneous manner. As well as the highs of success he relished the camaraderie of fellow runners.

Adrian Peter Loveday Weatherhead was born to parents Gordon and Dorothy in St Albans, Hertfordshire, where he was initially brought up along with young brother Jeremy. He attended St Albans School and sang in the local cathedral choir. In 1957 after the family moved to Edinburgh because of his father's work as a Director of the Federated Employers' Insurance Company, Adrian attended Daniel Stewart's College, now Stewart's Melville College. There he particularly enjoyed rugby as a wing forward, one early report describing him as "an outstanding forward for taking every chance". He took up running to be fit for rugby and by his final year was in the 1st XV, vice-captain of the athletics team and runner-up in the annual Sports Championship. The family home bordered Campbell Park in Colinton where Adrian would train regularly, his father having removed part of the garden hedge to facilitate direct access for him to the park.

The family had homes in Balerno, Howedenhall and Mortonhall before moving to Colinton.

After leaving school he concentrated on athletics as he studied chemistry at Heriot-Watt University. By then a member of Edinburgh's Octavians Athletic Club and inspired by the feats of top world milers Peter Snell and Jim Ryun, Adrian began to progress, first appearing in the 1965 Scottish ranking lists in the 880yds (800m). Assisted by Octavians coach George Sinclair and Heriot-Watt coach Bill Walker with input from the training schedules of John Anderson, Adrian trained religiously every day, often twice daily, with the emphasis on high quality track speed work combined with stamina building through winter mileage. He also joined Polytechnic Harriers in London to access top level competition.

His dedication began producing results and in 1971 on 19 June in Leicester he achieved his first sub-four minute mile with a time of 3mins 58.5secs. bringing a letter of congratulations from Sir Roger Bannister. Later that year he won bronze in the AAA's [British] 5,000m championship. Numerous championship successes followed, including Scottish indoors and outdoors gold medals at 1500m and 5,000m, silvers and bronze in the AAA's indoors 1500m and 3,000m, gold in the English Inter Counties 5,000m and at the Spanish Games in Madrid over 1500m, as well as British and Scottish international vests.

Pride of place among his many achievements was his fastest mile of 3m 57.59secs at Crystal Palace in 1975, two seconds behind world record holder Filbert Bayi but ahead of future Olympic champion Steve Ovett and top Scot Frank Clement. Beating world class miler André de Hertoghe at Meadowbank in an international against Belgium thanks to a blistering final lap was another highlight. In 1977, at 33, he ran his last sub-four minute mile, one of the oldest athletes to achieve the feat.

In the early 1970s Adrian joined Edinburgh Athletic Club, with whom he shared the National Cross Country team title five times, and on the roads won team gold in the Scottish Six Stage Relay. When he debuted in


the Edinburgh-Glasgow Relay aged 39 he won his stage by a whopping 33secs and remained extremely competitive until retiring at 46.

After graduating from Heriot-Watt Adrian worked for BP before joining Ethicon then moving into local government with Lothian Regional Council in the education department. On 24 July 1972 in Edinburgh he married Jean Gibson, whom he had met socially, and they set up home in Colinton, where they remained. They enjoyed a long, happy marriage, celebrating their golden wedding recently.

Following early retirement in 1996 he pursued a number of interests including astronomy, small bore target shooting and guitar. He was also a popular guest at Octavians reunion lunches where his company was much enjoyed by all. Adrian died suddenly near Faro while on holiday in Portugal. He is survived by his wife, brother Jeremy and his wife Eunice and was an Uncle to Mark, Emma and David.

Ronald McKay. 1928-2022 Daniel Stewart's College 1934-1947)



Ronald McKay, who has died aged 93, was a pupil at Daniel Stewart's for his entire school career. Much of his senior education took place during the war, when many of the masters were brought out of retirement to replace the younger men who were off fighting. Even the pupils were required to do their bit for the war effort by fire-watching on the school roof at night. After school he did National Service and was always grateful to

have served in the ranks where he met a cross section of society, a valuable experience for a sheltered middle class boy. He then went to Edinburgh University to study medicine, subsequently becoming a consultant radiologist, first in the West Midlands and then in Raigmore Hospital, Inverness. He also worked in Fiji for two and a half years, an adventurous move which lead to a very happy time for him and his wife Margaret and their young family. It gave him a taste for travel which he and Margaret continued to enjoy well into old age. He never lost his well developed sense of humour and of the ridiculous and his family and friends have fond memories of his fits of infectious laughter.

The saddest time in his life was just weeks before his own death when his eldest son Martin died of cancer. He is survived by his wife and three remaining children, Peter, Vivien and Richard.

Martin McKay, Stewart's Melville College 1973-1976



Martin McKay has died in Kent, aged 60.

Born in Edinburgh but raised in the West Midlands, Fiji and Inverness, Martin joined Stewarts/Melville as a boarder in 1975, following the footsteps of his father Ronald.

After settling into Dean Park House, Martin soon started to make an impact on school, being taught in P7 by Mr Davidson, who would later be described as the most influential teacher he ever had. Despite the head of boarding Ian Templeton's exasperation, Martin made something of a trademark of his ability to be constantly late, with a slightly disorganised appearance. This outwardly laissez faire presentation belied Martin's sharp and inquisitive mind and he excelled in most subjects, especially art.

However, it was the 'outdoor week' in second year, based at St Fillans that Martin always remembered from his Stewarts days - the week involved climbing Ben Vorlich and Stùc a' Chroin which sparked a lifelong passion for the outdoors. He completed the Scottish Munros in 2005 and also loved climbing in England, Italy, Poland as well as in Jordan - his Mont Blanc climb was a triumph. However, he was

always drawn back to Scotland's peaks, particularly in the Highlands.

Martin left DSMC after just 3 years, completing his education at Inverness Royal Academy. His love of and ability in art led him to complete a BSc in architecture in Aberdeen, with his first job in London. In his mid-30's, he bravely returned to education to complete an MSc in Urban Planning followed by his Masters at Edinburgh College of Art.

As a conservation architect, Martin was instrumental in saving many historic buildings throughout the southeast of England, including much of the historic WW2 warehousing in and around Chatham Dockyard. He had an absolute passion for older buildings, including his own former pilot's house overlooking

the Thames at Gravesend which he transformed. He was instrumental in saving many of his adopted town's historic features and was a founding member of Urban Gravesham, a campaigning body set up to save north Kent's architectural past.

He had a lifelong passion for the outdoors and, as well as walking and climbing, he loved sailing his boat on the Medway and Thames.

He is truly missed by his family and many great friends from both north and south of the border. At his funeral, he was described as a passionate, driven yet compassionate and thoroughly decent man.

This is how he will be remembered.
